



clude four launches of hot air balloons Friday & Saturday evening and Saturday & Sunday morning; June 2-4. All launches take place at the Cambridge Central School on Route 22 (wind and weather permitting). Evening launches typically occur around 7 p.m.; morning launches at 5:30 a.m.

LOTS TO DO FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY

Between the launches, the Cambridge community throws out the red carpet and provides a myriad of activities to entertain the crowds.

Community businesses, through the Chamber, host a fantastic firework display on Friday evening at the Mansion at South Union Park on South Union Street.

On Saturday, the Chamber organizes a "Taste of Cambridge" at the same location to showcase local food producers and restaurants. The "Taste" is followed by the annual Moon Glow, a spectacular night time display of tethered hot air balloons that are lit from inside in time to music.

Sunday brings an end to the official festival activities with a Pilots Breakfast (location to be announced). This is a great opportunity to meet the pilots and discuss the details of ballooning with the experts.

COMMUNITY SPONSORED EVENTS

Local organizations augment the festival with activities to entertain crowds between the launches and to showcase the Cambridge community. At the school location there are rides, carnival games, food vendors, and sporting events.

In the Village, activities such as craft fairs, farmers' markets, museum tours, concerts, car show and gallery events occur. Information will be posted on the Chamber website. The Chamber will also distribute a commemorative program and a schedule of events in May. www.cambridgenychamber.com

"This is our first time hosting the tapping ceremony and we're very excited for it," said Jill Galusha of Toad Hill Maple Farm. "We've been involved with the Maple Open House Weekends for over ten years. We really enjoy meeting people that are interested in maple; and find that it's a great opportunity to teach people about what's involved in the sugaring process."

The Maple Open House Weekends take place March 18th-19th and March 25th-26th, from 10am-4pm daily. The public is invited to take a free tour of 24 different Upper Hudson region sugarhouses and see how maple syrup is produced.

"We're inviting area families to come and experience firsthand the sights, smells, and sounds of maple sugar-making," said David Campbell, a Salem, NY producer and president of the Upper Hudson Maple Producers Association. "Most sugarhouses offer samples and demonstrations, and many of the locations serve a pancake breakfast, as well, for a nominal fee," Campbell said.

"Toad Hill Maple will be using a hay wagon to give visitors a tour of our sugarbush," said Galusha. "We will be showcasing our new covered bridge on the tour."

Sugarhouses participating in the Upper Hudson event are located throughout Washington, Warren, Saratoga, Rensselaer, Fulton, and Montgomery counties. New to the event this year is Battlehill Maple in Fort Ann, NY.

Signs will be placed along roadsides over the course of both

weekends to direct motorists to the sugarhouses. Please visit www.upperhudsonmaple.com for more information about the event.

New York ranks as one of the top maple producing states in the U.S. As spring temperatures begin to rise in late February and early March, maple trees and sugar bushes come alive with activity. In Northern New York, when the sap begins to drip through sugaring lines, it's a sure sign that maple season has begun and spring is on its way. The Upper Hudson region is among the largest syrup producing areas in New York State.

The Upper Hudson Maple Producers Association is a trade organization representing over 50 different maple producers, including sugaring operations ranging from less than 100 taps to over 10,000. They work together to raise consumer awareness of pure maple syrup made in the Upper Hudson Region.
