Local catering company, Un Petit Cochon, will have tacos near the Greenwich Free Library and Revolution Café will be offering a variety of food on the corner of Church Street and Washington Square. A Fried Dough truck will be parked near TD Bank on Main Street and Round House Bakery Café will have pizza in front of Battenkill Motors Repair at 50 Main Street. Reggie's Veggies will be set up at the eastern end of Main Street, near the Argyle Brewing Company, which will also be open.

New this year! Official Tractor Parade shirts! These and all other parade souvenirs (light sticks, hats, mugs, etc.) are available for purchase now at the Chamber office (6 Academy Street, Greenwich) and will be sold the evening of the parade at the Food Court near 70 Main Street and in Mowry Park. Also look for mobile vendors along Main Street where you can pick up some great parade memorabilia. Greenwich Central School FBLA will have souvenirs and food items for sale at the parade line up area at the School. There will be portable toilets in Washington Square, Mowry Park, the food court near 70 Main Street,



and 10 Main Street (corner of Washington Street and Main).

Parade organizers are encouraging people to arrive before 5:00 PM to find parking on side streets and in designated parking areas and to avoid any street closures and detours.

Parade organizers and the Greenwich/Cambridge Police Department will set up a detour route early on Saturday, November 18. Detour notice signs will be posted on the affected roads a week in advance to give travelers to Cambridge, Salem, Jackson, Hebron & Vermont time to make alternate travel plans for the evening of November 18 from 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM.

People traveling to Vermont, Salem, and points north should consider using State Route 40 North to County Rte. 49 to State Route 29 in East Greenwich. Motorists to Cambridge, Jackson, Easton, and southern Vermont will be detoured via State Route 40 South to Hegeman Bridge Rd. Turn right onto Louse Hill Road to the end and then turn left onto County Rte. 74. At the end of County Rte. 74 turn right onto State Route 372. The routes will be marked "Detour" in advance.

Parade organizers appreciate the cooperation and understanding of all travelers and hope that any inconvenience is minimal.

Local residents are encour-

aged to carpool or walk to the parade route. Parking will be prohibited along Main Street from Academy Street to Washington Street, both sides of Hill Street, John Street, Washington Street, Church Street and at certain corners along the parade route. There is a Handicapped Parking area on Woodlawn Avenue at the side of the Greenwich Central School Middle Grade building.

The 2017 parade begins at Greenwich Central School on Woodlawn Ave., in the High School parking lot. It then turns right onto Church Street, makes a left turn onto Main Street, takes participants through the business district, takes a right onto Washington Street, then right onto Bleecker Street, and left onto Hill Street. Please be patient with all tractors.

Suggested locations for viewing the parade are Mowry Park, Main Street between Academy and Washington Streets and anywhere else along the parade route.

Parade organizers are asking for your help with parking on side streets and using side streets to exit the village after the parade. Please spread the word about the Detour routes for those who need to get through the village of Greenwich on the evening of November 18.







SALEM – The Agricultural Stewardship Association (ASA) invites all landowners to a presentation on woodland management with Rich McDermott, NYS DEC forester from the Warrensburg office. Rich has worked for the DEC for 19 years. His work as a state forester includes administering recreation, timber sales, trespass, permits and many more duties on NYS forest land. In addition Rich participates in educational programs for students and teaches the silviculture and ecosystem portions of the New York logger training in our region.

### **Farmland Protection Workshops**

GREENWICH, New York -Two upcoming informational sessions, free and open to the public, are being held so that local farmers may learn more about the competitive state Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) grants. The workshops will discuss the parameters of the state program so farmers can determine whether it might be suitable for their farms and how to apply for funding. The Agricultural Stewardship Association (ASA) is accepting pre-applications for the state farmland protection program through December 31st. Attending the workshop is not a prerequisite to complete the pre-application, but is highly encouraged.

The sessions are being held:

• Monday, December 4th 7pm to 9pm – ASA's office; 2531 State Route 40, Greenwich (across the street from the USDA offices)

• Tuesday, December 5th 1pm to 3pm – Brunswick Community Center; Keyes Lane (off Hoosick St.), Troy

The state program provides financial compensation to farmers who voluntarily wish to conserve their farms for agricultural use by selling their development rights. Farmers often use the funds to make improvements on the farm, expand or diversify their operation, purchase support land, help transfer the farm to the next generation, reduce debt, or establish a retirement fund.

For the selected pre-applications, ASA, with the endorsement of the Washington and Rensselaer counties Agricultural and Farmland Protection Boards, writes the grants free of charge and submits them to the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markers for consideration. The state ranks the proposals on a regional basis.

# Local Students In 126th Annual Production

HOOSICK – Students at Hoosac School are busy rehearsing for the 126th production of the Boar's Head and Yule Log, a nationally recognized pageant. The annual production involves all of Hoosac's boys and girls and faculty members.

Divided into two parts, the celebration begins with the Boar's Head carol representing the gathering of Elizabethan gentry at the manor house to celebrate the birth of Christ. A solemn procession heralds the entrance of guests bearing food for the feast. In the place of honor is the boar's head, decorated with flags representing the Holy Roman Empire in the 16th century and symbolizing the conquest of good over evil. A flaming plum pudding also has a place of honor. Its richness and gaily colored fruit represent the gifts of the three kings. Shepherds enter in song seeking the newborn child. The carol between King

Wenceslas and his page symbolizes the virtues of caring for the less fortunate. The three kings sing in solemn procession bearing their gifts.

A medieval banquet is served during intermission by Beefeaters in the school's Memorial Dining Hall, a vaulted, cathedral-like structure with flags lining the rafters. The flags represent the home countries of students who have attended Hoosac during the past 120 years.

A shift in mood takes place in the second act when the revels begin, and the country folk join the gentry in song and games. The wassail bowl is carried in, and Father Christmas, accompanied by sprites usually played by faculty children, brings in the Yule



Log which is lit with a torch made from last year's embers. A hush falls over the audience as the house lights go out and the Jester enters declaring himself the "Lord of Misrule." Following the Jester, sword dancers entertain with a ritualized duel. A mummers play, a medieval burlesque of St. George slaying the dragon, is

performed.

The evening closes with caroling. This year's pageant will be held on December 14 (Community Night), December 15 (for Alumni and Trustees) and December 16 (for Parents).




tural and political overtones are revealed both by lens and the distancing of time. We will compare the earlier snapshot with our current iPhone/Snapchat culture.
