Historic Eastfield Village, in East Nassau, NY, is celebrating its annual Founders' Day Open House on Saturday, September 21 from 11:00 am to 4:00 pm. This is the one day of the year that the general public is invited to come and visit the privately-owned, recreated nineteenth century village. Admission is \$20; children accompanied by an adult are free.

Guests can tour more than 20 historic structures and their furnishings, dating from 1789 – 1840. Master craftsmen, including a printer, tinsmith, blacksmith, cabinetmaker, potter, flax workers, scissor artist, slate carver and more, will be demonstrating their skills and selling their

wares.

Enjoy nineteenth century entertainments including a Storyteller, "Shape- note" Singing, Magician, Music, and Miniature Hot Air Balloons. Other demonstrations include presentations by Eastfield's own 1830s "Militia," and a dramatic display of rare lamps and period lighting.

Patrons can enjoy tea and sweets or a hearty lunch available for sale at the Briggs Tavern, and can shop for handcrafted items and antiques.



18th Annual Landscapes for Landsake Art Sale & Exhibition Opens Columbus Day Weekend

CAMBRIDGE - Since 1990 the Agricultural Stewardship Association (ASA) has worked to accomplish a singular mission: protect the farms, rich soils and agricultural landscape in Washington and Rensselaer counties for future generations. In that time, ASA has managed to conserve 133 farms and 22,328 acres. For the last 17 years, a significant source of funding for this mission has come from Landscapes for Landsake Art Sale and Exhibition, a celebration of the land by the community of local artists.

The show opens on Saturday, October 12th from 12 to 5 p.m with a wine and cheese reception. Admission is \$10 per person. The gallery is also open from noon to 4 p.m. on Sunday and Monday free of charge. This year's exhibition features the work of over 60 artists, eighteen of which are participating for the first time. Many of the artists

will be on hand to discuss their work throughout the weekend. The sale takes place in the historic barn at Maple Ridge, 172 State Route 372 in the hamlet of Coila, just west of the Village of Cambridge.

Participating artists generously donate 50% of their proceeds to support ASA's farmland conservation work.

This year's featured painting, Jini's Barn, was painted by Virginia "Jini" McNeice. The oil painting is inspired by a building on her farm and is characteristic of her vibrant color palette. Jini was a prolific painter with artwork in collection across the country. Sadly, Jini passed in early March, Jini is one of three artists that has participated in the show since the very beginning and was the featured artist in 2003. Reflecting on her work, she once wrote that she is strongly influenced by the areas local agricultural landscapes.

She loved the strong traditional shapes of the farm buildings and vibrant colors of the changing seasons.

The exhibit is curated by Leah McCloskey, a resident of Salem, NY and active supporter of local farmers.



Handwritten Cook Books Lecture

GERMANTOWN – Tickets are now on sale for the lecture "A Taste of Change: Handwritten cookbooks as documents of social and family history" to be held at Clermont State Historic Site on Saturday September 28 at 4:00 pm.

Cookbooks and scrapbooks tell us a lot more than just how a dish is made. What recipes are included often give us an indication of the family's ethnicity and how that ethnicity was retained over generations through the continuation of customs and celebrations. Using her knowledge of Dutch customs and food history, food historian Peter G. Rose will discuss examples of such recipe/scrapbooks, dating as far back as the late 17th century and ranging to the 20th century that contain Dutch recipes.

They show the continued identification with the forebears, but also the gradual assimilation. Photographs of pages in cookbooks as well as 17th-century paintings will illustrate the talk. The audience is encouraged to bring old family cookbooks/recipe boxes and a discussion of the importance of saving such items is part of the program.










Lighted Tractor Parade

Event Raises Awareness, Provides Support for Stillbirth

SARATOGA SPRINGS - Angel Names Association (ANA), an area nonprofit that helps bereaved families across the country, will host its 14th annual Memorial Walk from noon to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 28, at Saratoga Spa State Park. This free family event, held in observance of National Pregnancy Loss and Infant Death Awareness month, aims to increase awareness of stillbirth and pregnancy loss and to provide support to families affected by child loss.

More than 26,000 stillbirths occur in the United States annually. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has reported that, for the first time, the number of stillbirths surpassed the number of infant deaths in the United States. ANA cofounder and president Michelle Mosca says the walk aims to remove the taboo surrounding stillbirth, and to give a voice to families who have experienced pregnancy loss.

"The impact of pregnancy loss and infant death is far-reaching, affecting not only the families who endure these losses, but also their friends, their colleagues, their employers and the healthcare providers who treat them," Mosca says. "The experience has emotional, physical and economic ramifications. It is a public health issue that must be addressed."

The uplifting, family-friendly event includes children's crafts, live music, refreshments and prizes.


